

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT & EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Thirty years ago, the world just started to learn about what would become known as one of the worst pandemics in history. On June 5, 1981, the Center for Disease Control (CDC) documented for the first time what became known as Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome (AIDS).

Over the course of the past thirty years, great strides have been achieved in learning how to prevent HIV/AIDS and ensuring those living with the disease have a positive quality of life. One of the major milestones achieved is the 15th anniversary of the introduction of highly active antiretroviral therapy (ART). ART revolutionized the treatment of the disease, transforming it from certain death to a chronic disease. 2011 not only marks the 30th anniversary of AIDS, it also marks the first time in history that AIDS will have been a treatable condition longer than it was the inevitably fatal disease first recognized.

It is due to milestones like ART and so many others that we entitled our community impact report "Turning the Page". Over the course of the past 30 years, we have see activism and advocacy that profoundly influenced

our nation's response to HIV/AIDS, scientific advances resulting in the development of lifesaving, albeit not curative, treatment of HIV, and development of prevention tools that reduced the number of new infections. In September of 1985, Alaska started turning our own page by opening our first HIV/AIDS organization; Alaskan AIDS Assistance Association, known now as Four A's.

Over the years Four A's has served over a thousand individuals who were infected with HIV and have reached over a hundred thousand individuals with our prevention services and messages. As you read our community impact report, you will learn how Four A's is continuing to turn the page towards improving the lives of Alaskans living with HIV/AIDS and eliminating new HIV infections and HIV stigma. We continue to maximize our resources to maintain a low overhead and ensure a higher percentage of each dollar we raise goes directly to services. We have grown our list of community partners so our clients have a wider array of services. We are exploring methods to expand our HIV prevention and education services to reach further outside the traditional urban areas.

With each passing year, we have turned the page to a new chapter in the fight against HIV/AIDS. With your continued support, Four A's will continue to eliminate new infections and HIV stigma while still ensuring those living with the disease and their families receive support that allows them to be an active member of our community. On behalf of the clients, Board of Directors and staff, thank you for all your help and continued support.



Four A's is the lead HIV/AIDS support service provider, offering services that expand across our great state. Over the past year, Client Resources reached not only those in greater Anchorage, but south toward Homer and Seward, across the entire Kenai Peninsula, along the coast and islands from Valdez to Ketchikan, north through the Mat-Su Valley to Fairbanks, east along the road system to Valdez, and west amid the villages off road.

One of our core values at Four A's is to meet the client where they are at, literally. Over 20% of our clients living with HIV/AIDS live outside of Anchorage. Living outside the urban center can be difficult for an individual who is HIV positive. Medical care and social services are limited in rural Alaska. Plus, the overall cost of living is much higher. But the value of an individual living where they want, around their natural supports, is immeasurable. Four A's has programs like STRMU (Short Term Rental, Mortgage & Utility) assistance that provides temporary help. This program was a life saver to a client in western Alaska. When the Yukon River froze early, exacerbating already excessive fuel prices, Agnes received utility assistance to buy winter heating oil for her family's home. Case management support helped Claudia, who lives just outside of Anchorage, regain a sense of dignity. We assisted her ingetting out of a domestic violence and camp-to-camp living by providing a rental subsidy so she could pass surrounded by family and friends, safely, in her own home.

In Anchorage, support services allowed Carl to sustain regular medical appointments and Chris to get back to work through the provision of monthly bus passes. Ed, who has a longstanding but seasonal fishing job, received COBRA support so he could continue his insurance coverage when the silvers were not running. Ted was able to sustain access to medications following a recent move to Alaska from Florida. And the list goes on and on. No matter if an individual resides on the road system or not, we will continue to be there to ensure the highest possible quality of life.

The services provided by Client Resources have been able to assist clients to turn their own page to a new chapter in their lives.


PREVENTION


2011 marks a major milestone for HIV Prevention - the White House released the first ever "National HIV/AIDS Strategy". This strategy refocused and re-tooled HIV Prevention to be better in line with epidemiological data and true successes in our fight to eliminate new HIV transmissions and its stigma. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention released recommendations to address the president's plan for HIV Prevention called High Impact Prevention. This approach is designed to maximize the impact of prevention efforts to those groups who carry the heaviest burden of infection. While all Americans are affected by the HIV epidemic, some populations account for the largest numbers of HIV infections. Success in HIV prevention can only be achieved by addressing these disparities and working to achieve health equity.

As the nations turned to a new page in our efforts, Four A's continued to implement a similar effort. Two years ago we began targeting, with increasing intensity, the two populations/communities with the highest rate of new HIV infections in Alaska: (1) Gay and bisexual men (MSM: Men who have Sex with Men) and the Injection Drug Users (IDU).

The MSM community remains the group most severely and disproportionately affected by the epidemic. Over the past year, we increased our efforts to get individuals in the community to know their HIV status. The number of outreach and testing events increased, which ensured this community was obtaining the tools they needed to actively prevent HIV. IDU community represents 22% of all HIV infection in Alaska. We continued to grow the syringe access program. We offered incentives for testing, bringing in more than 200 IDU's and their partners in the last year. In addition, over 150,000 clean syringes were distributed and several thousand risk reduction conversations occurred.

Remaining at the forefront of HIV Prevention in Alaska, and implementing the new strategy years before the rest of the nation, the Four A's is leading the battle to eliminate new infections. Four A's is turning the page to the future of HIV prevention with increasing optimism. We will continue to be at the forefront to ensuring a healthy Alaska.
